## **Lesson Plan and Activities**

#### Page to Stage

Prior to watching the performance, respond in writing to the socratic seminar questions comparing the original text to the performance

#### Shakespeare Taboo

In this activity, students will gain a new appreciation for Shakespeare. Each card contains a word first penned by Shakespeare.

#### Paraphrasing

Paraphrasing is Orlando Shakespeare Theater's primary tool for unlocking Shakespeare's text.

#### Write a Review

After seeing the production, have each student write a review of Orlando Shakes' production.
