

THE TRUE STORY OF THE **BUTTLE PICE**

Grade Level(s): Kindergarten - 1st Grade
Subject: Social Studies
Florida Standards: SS.1.A.2.5
Objective: Distinguish between historical fact and fiction using various materials.

Materials:

- The True Story of the 3 Little Pigs Book
- Crayons
- Pencils
- Worksheets
- Poster board, if desired

Activity:


The teacher and students will recall how the play ended after the audience voted. The teacher will ask which students agree with the audience and if any students disagree with the vote. The teacher will use this to ask the students to identify the facts and opinions in the story. The students will use the diagram to list the pigs' perspective, the wolf's perspective and the shared perspective. The students will then create a poster or flyer to promote their chosen side of the story. Students can be divided into two teams, one telling the pigs' version of the story and the other telling the wolf's version of the story. Each student's poster or flyer will show why they support their chosen character. The teacher will assist students in sharing their work and discussing the consequences of using opinions to make decisions. The teacher will facilitate the discussion emphasizing the difference between fact and opinion and asking questions to lead the students to acknowledge another's point of view. The teacher will direct the students to discuss the point of view of the character they did not choose to try to understand their experience or point of view,



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Assessment:


- Students can distinguish between facts and opinions.
- Students can use the Venn diagram to demonstrate this understanding.
- Students can articulate and explain why they chose one version of the story and not the other.
- Students can understand that even when there are differences in opinions, there is always value in understanding the other point of view.
