
Spotlight Guide 2025-2026

Page to Stage Lesson Plan - In this lesson, students will read and analyze an excerpt from Act II, Scene 2 of William Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* using the included handouts.

Shakespeare Taboo - Students will gain a new appreciation for Shakespeare's contribution to the English language.

Paraphrasing - Students unlock Shakespeare's text by rewording of the meaning of the lines into their vernacular.

Write a Review - After seeing the production, have each student write a review of Orlando Shakes' production of *Romeo and Juliet.*

Discussion & Themes -

- 1. What is the purpose of the Prologue? What is the rhyme scheme and how does it affect the speakers and the hearers?
- 2. What reasons do Juliet's father give for her marrying Paris? What reasons do Juliet give for not wanting to marry Paris?
- 3. Do Friar Laurence and the Nurse counsel Romeo and Juliet well?
- 4. What do we learn from the exposition in the fight between Tybalt and Benvolio in Act 1?
